## Welcome to the Autumn edition of our newsletter!

Located at Waterbeach Waste Management Park, Cambridgeshire County Council work with Thalia, our service provider to raise the awareness of the importance of waste reduction, reuse, repair, and recycling across Cambridgeshire.

We have a fabulous Education Centre at Waterbeach where we offer thought-provoking presentations on waste reduction, recycling etc. As well as various 'hands-on' activities, (including sorting out your recyclables). We also offer a chance to view the Material Recovery Facility, (where your blue-bin recycling waste is sorted). We carry out recycling workshop visits across the county to schools, community groups, parish councils and organisations and support a wide range of community events across the year.



As part of Cambridgeshire County Council summer activities, the waste team with the support of our eco waste partners, (inc. Recoup and Cambridge Carbon Footprint), held a series of family recycling events at our Waste Education Centre at Waterbeach. They were held across four days in August and over 120 people enjoyed taking part in a variety of activities including: making hats from old tee-shirts, making puppets from socks, enjoying tasty fruit skewers made from surplus fruit and seeing their recyclable waste being sorted for recycling. Participants were also encouraged to take part in various recycling games and some even got to star in a video!

"We were busy all the time, the children, (and their parents) enjoyed themselves and were excited with the design possibilities. We had some great feedback from them including amazing resources, informative, fascinating tour and most importantly, I am going to change some of our behaviours around eating and recycling at home! I'd like to thank all our partners who supported us and can tell you that we are already planning the next event."

# Meet the band of repairers ready to fix your stuff and find out how to get involved!

The Repair Cafe movement is going from strength to strength in Cambridgeshire with the number of events in the county set to double to over 40 this year with more and more people bringing their broken toasters, lamps, clothes, gadgets, and other items to be repaired by volunteer repairers. Repair Cafes prevent emissions (about a quarter of a tonne of CO2 per Repair Cafe - equivalent to a car journey from Lands' End to John O'Groats), reduce waste, help with the cost-of-living crisis by offering free repairs and, most importantly, brings people together.

Mike is one of the longstanding repairers and helps to look after the two shared toolkits that are borrowed by Repair Cafes across the county: "I am a retired product designer. I began my career in hifi design, then moved on to be a design consultant in electronics. To me repairing is as much a social benefit as an environmental benefit."

Matt and Savinien are part of a growing group of younger repairers who work for local tech companies. Savinien finds repairing directly relevant to his work as a product designer "As we face multiple environmental crises, I feel that it is part of my responsibility as an engineer to ensure that the products I design are as sustainable as possible... by participating in Repair Cafes I can answer many of the critical questions to design a sustainable product, such as how it broke, its repairability, the reasons behind its failure, the availability of spare parts, and how it actually functions."

Matt, who works for Sentec a Xylem brand, one of the sponsors of the Cambridgeshire Repair Cafe Network, stresses the value of interacting with the public: "It feels like how engineering is meant to be done. It has brought me into direct contact with the purpose of my work: the people. The conversations, the joy of shared troubleshooting, the appreciation for what I've come to think of as common sense in my day-to-day job, all in a low-pressure environment, with tea and cake. What a pleasure. I would recommend it to anyone!"
